# Promoting International Maritime Order based on the Rule of Law and Freedom of Navigation through Capacity Building of Coast Guard Organizations in the Indo-Pacific Region

# FOREWORD / SCOPE AND OBJECTIVES

The Program is aimed at assisting coast guard officers in the region to foster their abilities to formulate high-level maritime safety and security policy and effectively address global maritime challenges.

In recent years, maritime crimes such as drug smuggling, human trafficking and piracy are significantly increasing and posing serious threats to regional countries including Japan in the Indo-Pacific region. It is, therefore, imperative for us to improve the capabilities of coast guard organizations having the mandate to maintain regional maritime safety and security. The Maritime Safety and Security Policy

Program (MSP) jointly organized by the Japan Coast Guard and the GRIPS provides opportunities for officers of such organizations to acquire necessary abilities to achieve this goal both at policy and field level with Master's Degree level education.

In this one-year program, officers from the JCG and other coast guard organizations from countries in the Indo-Pacific region will study for eight months at GRIPS in Tokyo and another four months at the JCGA in Hiroshima. At GRIPS, students study various topics including international law, international relations, international security, etcetera for compulsory courses. And students are also able to receive some optional courses as well. At the JCGA, they will take more practically oriented courses, such as maritime law enforcement policy, marine environment, and ship management/operations. Students also learn how to effectively deal with a variety of maritime events and accidents by undertaking case-studies of past events and conducting table-top exercises on SAR operations, suppression of criminal activities and maritime disaster response operations.

By the end of the program, students are expected to acquire abilities to creatively formulate policy and effectively address maritime challenges. Most importantly, students are expected to develop strong personal bonds that will enable them to work together to deal with issues and challenges. They encounter today and will do so in the future.

- 1. Present Position : An officer working in a maritime safety and security related organization in one of the following positions:
- •Section chief or equivalent at a central authority (if serving under a central authority)
- •Assistant division chief or equivalent at a local authority (if serving under a local authority)
- •Lieutenant, Lieutenant Commander or Commander (or an equivalent rank)
- •Inspector or superintendent (or an equivalent title if in law enforcement)
- 2. Job experience in maritime safety and security related areas/organizations; three years or more.
- 3. Educational Background: Having a bachelor's degree or its equivalent
- 4. Admission priority will be given to applicants who have a TOEFL iBT score of 79 or higher, or an IELTS Academic score of 6.0 or higher.
- 5. Under the age of 45


